

River Scout Gets An Overhaul for New School Year

For more than 40 years, the River Scout has served the Environmental Studies Center and carried more than 100,000 students to give them an experience that no classroom can match. The boat's unique design and the fact that it's carried generations of Martin County school children, make it instantly recognizable and a cherished sight whenever it's spotted on the water.

This year, students and local boaters will notice some major changes to the River Scout. The boat received a large upgrade with support from the Environmental Studies Council and a grant through the National Save the Sea Turtle Foundation. Most notably, the entire boat received new paint and an exciting hull wrap depicting an underwater scene complete with a sea turtle, fish, and coral reef. Safety equipment including a new VHF radio and Garmin navigation system were installed. New life jackets were also purchased for all the staff and students. Before being put back in the water, the

Michael Chatham retired from the Environmental Studies Center in January, 2008, after 15 years as its director. He spent the last 7 years following his many passions: fishing, camping, traveling,

spending time with his family, and welcoming his grandchildren, Luca and Audrey. Unfortunately, Mike died suddenly this past summer while traveling through Arkansas on a vacation with his wife, Denise.

As director of the Center, Mike supported the hands-on approach to environmental learning. He was successful in securing funding for revisions to the original turtle tank, a new water treatment system, more touch tanks, and improvements to the wet lab. He was also instrumental in moving the water displays from the Orange Door classroom and installing waterproof flooring. He would be proud and supportive of the continued improvements to the Center today. Mike's life revolved around his love of nature. As an avid surfer, he would stop by the beach on his way to work to catch a few waves. As a laid back, patient person, it wasn't a surprise that fishing was his favorite past time. A conversation with Mike wasn't complete without "fishing" as one of the topics! In retirement, after a relaxing day on the water, he would stop by the Center and share his catch and a few stories with his former employees. Many days were spent fishing with his grandson, Luca, by his side. We are sure he will be stepping into his grandfather's footsteps with this experience and training under his belt.

Ask anyone about Mike Chatham and you will hear about the many reasons he was well-loved.

Past students in his science classes at Murray Middle School remember him as their "favorite" teacher who hooked them on science and love of the environment. The staff at the Center saw Mike as a friend, colleague and "the boss," in that order. Everyone enjoyed his sense of humor, his great smile, fun conversations and his contagious laugh.

Even in his retirement, Mike remained dedicated to the center. He shared his knowledge with many more students during his time substitute teaching, served on the committee for the new turtle tank, and brought his family to many Center events.

We will always remember Mike for his kindness, compassion, friendship, and his love of life.

CLASS NAMES NEW SEA TURTLE

Congratulations to Mrs. Sherri K. Saxton's kindergarten class at Pinewood Elementary School for choosing the winning name for the Environmental Studies Center's new resident sea turtle!

The winning name is "Scute," named after the hard plates that cover the outside of a turtle's shell. The scutes are made of keratin, which is also the key component of hair and fingernails. The arrangement of scutes on the shell is different for each species and helps biologists identify them.
