2021 Turtle Walks

The Environmental Studies Council will be hosting 2 guided sea turtle walks this summer after taking a hiatus last summer due to COVID-19. Participants will be given an educational presentation while our scouts patrol the local beaches looking for a nesting turtle. The scouts will be looking for a loggerhead sea turtle emerging from the water trying to find the perfect place to lay her eggs. If we are lucky, our scouts will find a mother who found a great spot on the beach and participants will get to view the egg laying and nest camouflaging process. This event is conducted under a Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) Martine Turtle Permit. Educational facilities, such as ESC, is the only safe and legal way to observe the nesting sea turtles. For more information on sea turtle visit MyFWC.com.

As we spring into summer, it's fun to think of all the fun, summery activities that await us. Long days at the beach, summer camp, maybe a family vacation or two. While we're spending our time playing outside, there are ways to make our recreation educational and even beneficial for the environment.

One of the many amazing things about Martin County is our water. My personal favorite thing to do is to get out snorkeling at St. Lucie Inlet State Park, located just south of the inlet. Some of the amazing creatures I've seen are nurse sharks, grouper, sawfish, and even manta rays.

The St. Lucie Inlet here in Stuart marks the northernmost point of the South Florida Reef Tract, a stretch of coral that runs from us here in Martin County and winds down around the Keys, ending at the Dry Tortugas. It's the largest coral reef tract in the contiguous United States. We have a unique opportunity here to be involved in monitoring the health of the reef through Florida Department of Environmental Protection's (FDEP) Bleachwatch Program. After a lesson from one of FDEP's biologists, you can help collect invaluable data- the health of our coral reefs.

The Bleachwatch program is part of FDEP's Seafan network. Citizen scientists, observers can report other marine anomalies including vessel groundings, anchor damage, and even marine debris- the trash- that you find floating in the ocean or washed up on shore.

Taking a guided sea turtle walk is also a great way to learn more about these special creatures that share our beaches. When you go with a knowledgeable guide, not only do you get intimate knowledge of sea turtles, but you're also more likely to see one.

Whether you're snorkeling this summer, going on a guided sea turtle walk, or simply helping by keeping our beaches clean, I wish you a fun-filled, watery summer here on the Treasure Coast.

Summertime means sea turtle nesting here in Martin County!

Three of the seven species of sea turtles found in the world nest right here on our beaches. These are the loggerhead, green, and leatherback. While sea turtle nesting season technically runs March 1 through October 31, each species has their own rhythm of nesting, the height of which is summertime. And no, sea turtles don't know when their nesting season is, so you'll notice they do not stay within this March to October timeline.

Leatherbacks kick off nesting season, with the first nest laid usually in February. The largest sea turtle in the world, these leathery giants spend most of their time in pelagic, or open, ocean, and in colder waters. In fact, leatherbacks have been seen as far north as the Arctic Circle!

Loggerheads typically start nesting here in mid to late April. Our beaches here have some



of the highest numbers of nesting loggerheads in the world!

Green sea turtles are the late comers, they start nesting towards the end of May, but they've been found nesting as late as Thanksgiving! These guys are so named not because their shell is green, but because they eat so much seagrass that their fat and tissues have turned the chlorophyll!

As you enjoy your beach time this summer, please remember we share the sand with these amazing creatures. Remember to leave the beach clean, dark, and flat, so we can have many more fruitful turtle seasons to come.
