Congratulations to Mrs. Carbaugh’s kindergarten class at Palm City Elementary for submitting the winning name, Coral, for the ESC’s new turtle. They enjoyed an ice cream sundae party and were excited to receive their own picture of Coral. They are looking forward to meeting her on their field trip to the Center in the spring.

EEL GRASS PLANTING

In November, Nick Muzia, Storm Water Engineer with Martin County, made an onsite presentation at the Coral Gardens Stormwater Treatment Area for five EarthSavers and their JBHS science sponsors, Nicky Weiler and Samantha Robertson. Nick explained the benefits of using natural processes, such as the planting of eel grasses (*vallisneria americana*) to filter out toxins from run-off waters before reaching the Indian River Lagoon. Earth Savers got their feet wet replanting the loose eel grass and removing some of the nuisance plants that hinder the growth of the eelgrass. It was a beautiful day and there were many birds taking advantage of the area.

The Environmental Studies Council hopes to make this an ongoing collaborative project with Nick and Martin County for the Earth Savers to assist in enhancing the water quality entering the Indian River Lagoon.
