Maggy Hurchalla inducted into the Hall of Fame



Maggy Hurchalla was born in 1940 in Coral Gables, Florida and witnessed the damage that accompanied Miami/Dade's unbridled development. While raising her family in Martin County, she saw a beautiful 650 acre parcel on Hutchinson Island sold to a developer instead of being put into conservation. This spurred her to run for the Martin County Commission in 1974, a position she famously held for 20 years. Maggy Hurchalla was a pioneer for responsible growth and protection of the environment. Later, she served on the 1994 "Governor's Commission for a Sustainable South Florida" that laid the foundation for today's Central Everglades Restoration Plan. Her knowledge of the St. Lucie River/Indian River Lagoon inspired the next fighting generation. Maggy Hurchalla's name is synonymous with the "Martin County Difference "and her legacy lives on in, and beyond Martin County.

Maggy passed away on February 29, 2022. She was inducted into the Environmental Studies Center Hall of Fame on May 8, 2024.

Maggy rallied so many around a vision that was intertwined with the way she led her life. It was rooted in her deeply, her belief in protecting our wetlands and waterways and safeguarding Florida's last remaining

green spaces.
